Our New Principal - Mrs Julie Ma



Stephen's College has an induction day for new teachers every year. To Mrs Julie Ma, the 'induction' was much more than going to briefings and understanding administrative procedures. 'I spent what was supposed to be my first school day trapped in my bungalow, while the campus was being battered by Super Typhoon Saola. Then there was the devastating rainstorm!'

But the College's 13th Principal and Warden said these were 'enriching' experiences. A staunch believer in teamwork, Mrs Ma had planned to reach out to her staff in the first few months to fully immerse herself in the school community, build friendships and above all, provide support and care. Thanks to these interruptions, she managed to do just that within days. 'It was a wonderful display of "togetherness", which I personally value a lot.' Not only was she pleased with the professionalism and swiftness of the responses – at one point she called the team 'the wisest and most dedicated' with which she has worked – she was also impressed by how staff

members brought out the best in each other. 'I bring my expertise to the table whenever I can, but as we all know, the impact of an individual is always limited. I am glad my team and I are growing together every day.'

This humility has much to do with Mrs Ma's faith. She is a devout Catholic who sees herself as a handmaid of the Lord wherever she goes. 'I believe it was the Holy Father who sent me to the education profession.' Upon graduating from The University of Hong Kong, Mrs Ma was all set on becoming a management trainee at Cathay Pacific. Knowing that there was some flexibility as to when the contract would commence, she accepted an invitation from a Sister at her alma mater – Marymount Secondary School (MSS) – to take up a short-term teaching position, for a try. She has never looked back since. 'God's grace is really sufficient. He knows what I am most interested in, and takes me to various places where I would be able to serve Him to the best of my ability,' she said with a smile.

"What's your favorite place?"

'I don't have a favorite place. I have my favorite people.

And whenever I'm with my favorite people, it becomes my favorite place."



After serving MSS for a decade, including several years as Panel Head of English, Mrs Ma joined the Education and Manpower Bureau (now the Education Bureau) as a curriculum development officer. Although she was no longer a frontline teacher, she held on to her calling: she was determined to bring people together in her new role. Spending most of her time visiting lower-banding schools, she gained invaluable insights into how a curriculum can be tailored to instil in even the weakest students a love for learning. 'I was trying to communicate with whole classes of children who spoke virtually no English and were convinced that learning a second language was useless,' Mrs Ma recalled. In response to this challenge, she worked closely with the teachers in those schools to run an exciting variety of school-based initiatives, such as an English Café, to boost intrinsic motivation. This was a rewarding job in that it reaffirmed her conviction that teaching is about helping students shine and soar in their own way and encouraged her to take the helm of Marymount Primary School, Marymount Secondary School and SKH Lui Ming Choi Secondary School so as to put that into practice. 'In a sense, we are our students' fans, and we root for them no matter which stage they are on!' she exclaimed.



How does Mrs Ma plan to make 'stages' for students at St Stephen's, then? 'The plan is not mine; it is ours,' she emphasised, 'because every child is unique and visionbuilding is everyone's business.' One of our priorities is the 'SSC Graduate Profile'. i.e. a core set of attributes that characterise all graduates of the College, be they from the HKDSE or IBDP stream. Mrs Ma remarked that while our boys and girls could use a greater degree of self-directedness, they have left an excellent impression on the whole: everybody she has met is 'proactive, friendly and courteous', especially those senior form students who went out of their way to welcome her to St Stephen's and proudly introduce the school. She is also glad that SSC students truly embrace allround education and recognise each other's diverse talents. 'I once asked a class of S1 pupils who the "best" student among them was. Guess what the response was? They said that would depend on what I meant by the "best"! the Principal laughed. Moving forward, Mrs Ma hopes that the College can capitalise on the state-of-the-art facilities of Benevolence House and better support students of various interests and aspirations. 'My predecessor Ms Yang had the foresight to build a Black Box Theatre and a gym in this awe-inspiring complex,' she said, 'so now is the time to develop



programmes around them.' In particular, the Carol Yang Black Box Theatre will be established as the hub of theatre education at St Stephen's. As a student and teacher of literature, Mrs Ma sees the drama as a vital instrument that develops one's creativity, empathy and agility. 'For example, performers who wish to make an impact have to first identify what would resonate with their audience, and when interaction occurs, they often have to adapt fast and can't really stick to the script,' she explained. In the long run, the Theatre can even be used as a multi-purpose space for other forms of art, such as dance and percussion. As for the gym, Mrs Ma stressed its role in helping students with goal-setting. 'Upon consulting teachers and coaches, students get to decide on which part of the body to focus on and keep track of their progress. In the process they strengthen their self-knowledge and self-awareness, which eventually gives rise to self-improvement. Training regimens are but a means to this end,' the Principal added.

Being a caring educator herself, Mrs Ma also cares a lot about her own well-being. Outside her job, she enjoys yoga, leisure driving, travelling and afternoon tea. 'These things can soothe my soul on the most hectic of days,' she said, 'but I have not had any hectic days at St Stephen's so far!' Let us all rejoice in the knowledge that God will lead the way for our new Principal in touching our hearts and scaling new heights with the College.





Chimes 2024!





CAS Expeditions to Cambodia

After a 3-year COVID-induced hiatus, we were finally able to recommence our CAS trips to Cambodia. They included one trip in July with the current S6 cohort and another in October with the S5 cohort. Below is a selection of student reflections covering both expeditions.

From departure to discovery

The whole SSC 2025 IB cohort went to the airport at 5:30 am sharp and it was surprising to see everyone was so wide awake, enthusiastic and prepared for the upcoming trip. Everything from saying goodbye to our parents to checking in at the airport was smooth. We arrived at Phnom Penh International Airport at approximately 11:00 am and the weather was unexpectedly nice and breezy.

We then boarded a coach to Camp Beng Pae. It was a six-hour journey, and what I loved about it was the small breaks we took. During one of the first breaks, we got to interact with defanged tarantulas. I had a live, moving tarantula crawling on my hands, then onto my arm. It was just the first hour of our arrival in Cambodia, and we were already experiencing new things, unlike anything we had tried in Hong Kong. After four hours and countless naps on the shuttle bus we arrived at Camp Beng Pae, which felt like a small, cosy community.

Community and embracing the unexpected

On the second day of my trip to Cambodia, we woke up early to travel to Camp Beng Pae in the countryside. This was a mental challenge for me, as we had just settled into the modern comforts of the city and I knew that the living conditions in the rural areas would be very different. I was anxious about sleeping on mattresses instead of beds, walking on sandy paths instead of pavements, and working in rural areas instead of touring the city. I also had concerns about insects and mosquitoes. Despite



my apprehensions, upon our arrival at Camp Beng Pae after a four-hour coach ride, I was pleasantly surprised. Our mattresses and sleeping nets were clean, and although the toilets and showers weren't as nice as those in the hotel, they were much better than I had expected. At night, we sang karaoke and had a great time at the camp. I was energised by the positive atmosphere and the sense of community that we had built in just a short time. This experience taught me the importance of being open-minded and embracing new challenges, even if they seem daunting at first. I'm grateful for this opportunity and look forward to applying the lessons learnt to other areas of my life.

Digging deep and unity in Cambodia

On the third day, we officially began our project work. Each group was assigned to assist a family by building a toilet or well. My group was given the task of digging two holes that would serve as a toilet for a family of four. The instructor showed us how to effectively use a shovel and hoe to transfer the sand into a bucket and create a hole. It was very tiring as the soil was hard and the sun was scorching. However, we persevered and slowly made progress. Then it was time for us to go down into

the hole one by one and use a shorter hoe to make the hole deeper. This was even more challenging, as each of us had to loosen the soil before collecting it in a basket and lifting it up so that others could empty it. We also decided to maximise efficiency: one person would fill 2-3 baskets before resurfacing unless they were too tired. This strategy ensured we maintained productivity and saved time. As we toiled, we also had opportunities to chat with the family members. One of the little girls was very shy, but we tried to break the ice and make her feel more comfortable around us. She gradually warmed up to us to the point where we could play and dance with her. This experience taught me the value of patience and perseverance in challenging situations.

Insights from teaching in a classroom

We went to one of the local primary schools to participate in their English class and impart knowledge of the language. In the first lesson, I was grouped with two little girls and we went through the alphabet and animal names. It was pleasantly surprising to see how engaged the little girls were. They would look at me every time they pronounced a word to make sure they were correct, and if they were, they would teach me the Khmer counterpart. They did not go easy on me: both of them made sure I pronounced each word correctly.



I was only supposed to participate in one lesson. However, during recess, I connected with another girl who, when it was time for the next lesson, led me back into the classroom. I was grouped with her and another student, and found them as enthusiastic as my previous group. They were incredibly curious and sincere, and their passion for learning was evident. The contrast between their eagerness for knowledge and the lack of educational resources was striking, prompting me to reflect on my own attitude towards learning.

At the end of the sessions, I gave the students presents. Their gratitude and joy filled me with mixed feelings. On the one hand, I was glad they liked the presents, but on the other hand, I realised that students in Hong Kong, being more privileged, might not have reacted the same way. This experience deepened my appreciation for my own life and reinforced my commitment to helping those in need.

Spending mornings watching the sunrise, catching up during meals, and enjoying evenings playing games, having karaoke sessions, and watching the stars together wasn't just the retreat we needed but also became an ultimate bonding experience.

I am grateful for every moment we spent together. This trip was a once-in-a-lifetime experience, teaching me about myself, my classmates, Cambodian culture and life, and the genuine happiness I felt. I will never forget these lessons and memories.

The lessons I learnt amidst Cambodia's rich tapestry

This trip has really broadened my vision of the world and the people in it. I got to see a third-world country living on charcoal and animals for money, and I got a grasp of how far behind some parts of the world are compared to others. The mud roads, wooden houses and farm animals gave me a reality check on the living conditions in rural areas of Cambodia. I also noticed obvious wealth disparity, not only the clear difference between the village and the city but also different houses in the rural areas. While most houses are made of wood, occasionally there would be one house with marble walls, beautiful paint jobs and two floors. The sharp contrast in living conditions was especially shocking to me. During the volunteer work, I didn't hold anything back. Like the others, I was glad to be involved and help. We gave it our all. I felt that I was actually making a difference and the work I put in would later make an impact on the Cambodian people's lives. I realised that making



small efforts like these can have a huge impact on others. After building the toilet on the second day, the owner came out and thanked us all as a group. He was so grateful and ecstatic, and I realized that I should be more grateful for the little things in life and not take things for granted.

However tiring, I enjoyed teaching, talking, and befriending Cambodians, and it really moved me since even under harsh circumstances they still had hearts of gold and were extremely kind. Being a Visual Arts student, I liked painting the wall of the school the most. This was the first time that I was given the chance to use my skill and passion to help people, and I enjoyed every second of it. I ended up painting 45 minutes more, as I just wanted the school to look as nice as possible for the kids. I also really liked the architecture in the city. Although old and small, the buildings were beautifully and strategically designed, it truly was a beautiful city, and it was not what I was expecting in Cambodia. This also helped me realise the impact and importance of art, and provoked my interest in architecture.

Finally, we visited S-21, a torture camp, and the Killing Fields where I experienced the horrifying nature of humans. It was a difficult experience to witness the horrors of the Khmer Rogue, but also educational, to show me that the world I live in isn't as comfortable as I thought it was, not all sunshine and flowers, but horrifying some of the time. It made me feel lucky and grateful for my current living situation, where the only problems I face are related to my studies. Overall, this was an educational trip, and it showed me things I had never seen before, the scale of the world and my place in it. I loved this opportunity to help the underprivileged and do my part in making their lives better.



Lessons from tragedy



Gifts of gratitude

Before we left the camp to travel back to Phnom Penh, we made a stop at the local school to give gifts to the children. After a brief exchange, we began distributing the gifts we had individually brought. Each child accepted their gift with a smile, and many had even made an effort to thank us in English. However, the most memorable moment for me came as I was about to walk away and rejoin my group after distributing all my gifts. One child approached and pointed at my hands. Confused, I tried to show him that my plastic bag was empty, but he continued to point. I then realised he was asking for the plastic bag itself. This simple request profoundly affected me; it was a stark reminder that even an item as ordinary as a plastic bag could hold significant value in the eyes of someone experiencing poverty. This interaction was perhaps one of the most striking examples of the impact of poverty I witnessed during my trip.

Contrasting educational realities

During the remaining days at camp, we painted the walls of a school and dug foundations for an English classroom. In addition to this, we conducted an English class for the children. Initially apprehensive about their response, we were pleasantly surprised by their enthusiasm and knowledge. The lesson involved teaching body part names, where we drew a human figure on the blackboard and the children identified each part. Their understanding far exceeded our expectations!

Despite studying in an environment that had ants and bare floors, these children displayed remarkable dedication, possibly surpassing some of us in Hong Kong. Their gratitude for educational opportunities and unwavering focus is something I believe we, as Hong Kong children, should learn from. With access to electronic devices, high-tech classrooms, and abundant learning resources, it's frustrating to see a lack of similar enthusiasm for learning among many of us who are more 'privileged'.



Another profound experience was witnessing the strong sense of community in Cambodian villages. On a particularly hot day while we were digging, two locals approached and assisted us with the work. Initially, I thought they were part of the camp staff, but they were actually passers-by who chose to help spontaneously. This was a bittersweet realisation of their community spirit, starkly different from what I've observed in Hong Kong. Here, people might pass by volunteers without engaging, but in Cambodia, people readily help each other with a familial sense of responsibility.

Delving into the heart of culture

When you go to Cambodia, it's essential to immerse yourself in the Cambodian culture. I'm grateful that our guides introduced us to several commonly used phrases in Khmer, their language. The phrase we used most frequently was "Or Kun," which means "thank you." Other phrases we often utilized included "Suo Sdey" for "hello," "Lea Heuy" for "goodbye," and "Bong Srolanh Oun" for "I love you." Beyond the language, we also learned about various Cambodian customs, such as the unique ways they conduct funerals and weddings and the significance behind their traditional greeting of putting hands together.

iGEM Jamboree 2023

GEM, an annual global competition focused on synthetic biology, has provided us with an incredible platform to develop practical solutions and tackle local and global challenges. One such challenge we addressed this year is melioidosis, a fatal disease caused by the pathogen *Burkholderia pseudomallei*. In Hong Kong, this infection has become widespread, with over 200 people contracting the disease each year. The rising number of cases poses a significant health threat that has been overlooked by local communities. The extensive yet ineffective treatment options further complicate the situation, putting residents' health at risk.

To combat this pressing issue, our SSC iGEM team has been working tirelessly on a sensing and cleaving system in *E. coli* cells, incorporating a self-regulatory kill-switch. This innovative approach aims to reduce the formation of biofilm, which in turn lowers the virulence of the pathogen. By leveraging available technology and knowledge in synthetic biology, we aim to provide a feasible solution to mitigate the impact of melioidosis.



Participating in iGEM has been an invaluable experience for our team. It has allowed us to gain valuable insights and hands-on experience in developing practical solutions for real-world concerns. Working in university laboratories equipped with advanced skills and technologies has deeply inspired us and broadened our horizons. Moreover, the collaborative nature of iGEM has fostered lifelong friendships and strong bonds within our team. Throughout the year, we have engaged in constant collaboration and communication, supporting each other's growth and learning.

The pinnacle of our iGEM journey is the grand event, iGEM Jamboree, where we had the opportunity to showcase our project to the international community. This event broadened our social network, allowing us to connect with other teams from around the world. We learnt tremendously from visiting their booths and engaging in fruitful discussions, further expanding our knowledge and understanding of synthetic biology.

We would like to extend our deepest gratitude to Professor Michael Chan Chi Wai, our alumnus, and Professor Xia Jiang, the father of one of our team members. Their unwavering support, guidance and the opportunity to work in their laboratories have been instrumental in our success. 祖父笑笑說,他很年輕的時候便隻身來到香港,準備創一番事業。他背上沒有包袱,眉宇間沒有皺紋,只有潛藏心底的家人和故鄉,那種淡淡的哀愁,總會被忙碌的生活節拍輕輕蓋過,感到落寞時直冒出來,又旋即被工作的重量壓了下去。回轉身來,他仍然默默地、辛勤地在洋行上班、接訂單和應付客人。下班後,狹小的板間房就是他起居之處,孤獨但不孤單。同屋的都是勞動階層,說起柴米油鹽,大家總是神情關切,互相安慰,互相幫助,例如祖父隔壁房間的德嫂沒有米糧,包租婆陳太便借出一元幾塊,替這個家庭解困。半夜,走廊不時傳來幼兒哇哇啼哭,他也只是把被子往懷內一捲,趕緊睡穩,絕不投訴,明早醒來又是一條好漢。原來,我這麼能睡,是不無道理的。

祖父早已是一名創作高手。當年人們喜歡吃馬芝連,但整條馬芝連被薄薄的包裝紙緊裹著,吃起來不方便。於是,祖父靈機一觸,「何不把牛油裁成小小的一塊,塗上麵包,拿起來就吃呢?」上司聽了,連忙通知生產部,過了一段日子,散裝的便面世了。原來,我喜歡吃牛油塗麵包,是不無道理的。

祖父一臉自豪地說,在香港工作多年,他終於成家立室,娶得美人歸。那時候,他在旺角胡社生行頂樓旋轉餐廳宴客,跟祖母拍攝的婚紗照片還完好地保留至今。相伴的歲月令祖父泛起微笑,其後就是添丁的喜慶:紅雞蛋、滿月酒、返家鄉、祭祖先。父親的到來,也成為祖父的驕傲。

祖父平日喜歡晨運,也愛看電視新聞報道,然後跟朋友通電話,或談天説地,或相約到家中聚會,或相伴到診所注射疫苗,或哀悼老朋友傷逝。他會放下悲傷,打掃家居,供奉祖先神位,祈求平安。祖父總能夠照顧自己,凡遇事也能處之泰然。原來,我從小便能自得其樂,是有原因的。

祖父會不時到我家中,慢慢地脱下口罩,換過衣服,坐下來閒話家常。他提到小時候的玩意與生活點滴,又手舞足蹈地示範如何把大麻繩子綑在佛山祖屋屋頂的窗框前,然後抓著繩子在大廳內旋轉舞動,傭人追著他、勸他停下來的情景。這真夠逗趣!原來,我舉止俏皮,手腳靈活,是不無道理的。

祖父有時會到我家住上一段日子。每逢周日,大家聊聊天,吃吃外賣下午茶。我愛幫忙把半暖不冷的奶茶翻熱,然後奉上給祖父品嘗。他也總是雙手合十,一面向我道謝,一面才接過奶茶。我也跟他分享甜食,與他一起看球賽,替他整理床鋪,給他戴上帽子外出。祖父看著我,總是滿臉笑容,充滿慈愛。

聚散

祖父如今也偶然入夢,跟我閒話家常,笑問我可安好,學業有否進步,待人接物是否得體。他又提到故鄉,尤其懷緬端陽佳節,就在那祖屋門前的河道,大家競龍舟,賽鳳艇,漫天旗幟,鳴響鼓樂的情境,讓他歷年未敢忘懷。

夢中的祖父神清氣朗,慈祥敦厚。究竟祖父離開了,還是從來沒有離開?暖暖的問候,潤澤了親情的種子,使其 萌芽,茁壯成長。愛能滋養心田,在我的記憶中,祖父的身教言教,就是最好的證明。
